
Dear Fellow Parishioners,



SUNDAY BULLETIN

THE ANNUNCIATION TO MARY



VIRGIN ANNUNCIATE. ANTONELLO DA MESSINA, 1476 In paintings of the annunciation you usually see the angel Gabriel visiting Mary with God's message. Antonello focuses on Mary alone as she is interrupted during her reading. She is neither crowned nor does she have a halo: she is a young woman of Nazareth. In this painting we, not Gabriel, are the viewers. Each of us is invited to look at Mary,

without Gabriel and without the distraction of a background, as she graciously responds to God's word.

Reading: Luke 1:26-38

REFLECTION

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Mary gives the classic response of the disciple when challenged by the word of God: "Let what you have said be done to me." That is her annunciation, her consent to hand over her body and spirit to God's purpose. The love that offers itself is the love that must wait. That is why there are two annunciations: God's annunciation to Mary and Mary's annunciation to God. God's best plans can only happen when there is human cooperation, when God's word and our word come together. When those two annunciations come together, God's word always becomes flesh.

Mary, like all mothers, gives over her body and mind and soul so that new life may be born. She does this so that a life larger than hers may take its own place in the world. All mothers must wait for the gradual process that is happening within them; they must learn to let go of the child within them. They must not only nurture the presence of the child within them; they must nurture the leaving of the child. The act of childbirth is the painful act of letting go, so that the life within can take its own separate place in the world. Mary's vocation is not only to hold Jesus within her but to let him go, let him become the person he must become.

Whatever Mary was planning for her life with Joseph, it did not include becoming pregnant outside that relationship. An unexpected word interrupts the routine of life and proposes a groundbreaking diversion from what is planned; nothing less


PRAYER



THE PRESENTATION IN THE TEMPLE



THE PRESENTATION IN THE TEMPLE. GREEK ICON, ANONYMOUS

Central to this icon is the ciborium, a covering supported by four columns that stands over the altar in a basilica. Mary hands over her son into the covered hands of Simeon, the prophet who has waited all his life to welcome this unique child. Behind Mary stands Anna, identifiable as a prophetess by the scroll she holds. Anna looks down at Joseph's offering - two turtle doves - which was the regular offering of poor people.

Reading: Luke 2:25-38

REFLECTION

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The parents of Jesus take him to the Temple in Jerusalem, where they meet two waiting people, Simeon and Anna. As old people they are connected with the past of promise and with memory; Luke presents them as anawim - the devout remnant of those who wait on the ancient promise.

Simeon and Anna have spent their lives in longing to see the fulfilment of those promises. They are an unusual couple of old people because their total concern is for the future. They don't live backwards, but forwards. Something yet to happen draws their lives onwards. They are alive with expectation and hope, waiting for the one who will be the consolation of their own people and the light for the Gentiles. They do not live in the past; Simeon and Anna inhabit the here and now. So you watch Simeon take the child into his arms; you watch old age reach out for the flesh of a promise fulfilled, gathering this promise into his quieting arms. And you hear him break into the poetry of the Nunc Dimittis.

And Anna: she is like some of the old women who seem always to be around our churches, praying and waiting, praying and waiting, and watching. Anna is always around the Temple night and day. She makes herself God's neighbourhood watch, and she has an energetic nose for what is happening in her neighbour's house. An inquisitive woman of faith, she is on permanent lookout: nothing is going to get past this old timepiece. Her timing is exquisite, since, Luke says, "She came by just at that moment" - she has been hanging around
